

Learning About Faces

There are many benefits of naming the parts of the face.

- The more your little one hears the names of different parts of the face, the quicker they'll understand and be able to use the words correctly.
- Seeing the words used for the same things in different contexts will help them realise that words like 'nose' all refer to the same things. Try taking turns naming 'your nose', 'daddy's nose'. You could also try 'teddy's nose'!
- Touch the parts of your little one's face as you name them. This helps strengthen their understanding and is great for boosting happy hormones.
