

Changing Nursery Rhyme Words

Changing the words to a favourite nursery rhyme is a fun way for your child to experiment with new words.



There are many benefits of making up rhymes:

- It helps children think imaginatively.
- It gets children thinking about word sounds and rhymes.
- Listening for the rhymes helps children identify sounds that are similar and sounds that are different - this fine tunes their listening ready for 'literacy'.
- It allows children to practise putting words they know into new contexts and reinforce their meanings.

Let's make an obstacle course!

All you need is: A sheet, movable household items to crawl and climb over and under, e.g. a stool, cushions, a sheet or scarf, paper or card for stepping stones, a cardboard box.



You could let your child choose the obstacles and make the course together. As they become more agile, add low jumps, commando-style crawling and objects to balance on. If it's a nice day you could make your obstacle course outside.

Remember to keep it safe, helping children find their own agility level and always supervising their play.
