Hampshire Early Help Services <u>Family help services in Hampshire | Children and Families | Hampshire County Council</u> provide support to families, children and young people facing various challenges. These services aim to intervene early to prevent issues from escalating. Key aspects include:

- Family Support Service (FSS): Offers co-ordinated support for families with children up to 19 years old, and up to 25 years for those with learning difficulties or disabilities
- Children's Centres: Provide a range of services for families with children aged 0-5, including parenting support, health services and early education
- Intervention Pathways: Help professionals identify the correct level of support for families, addressing concerns such as child development, behaviour management, and mental health. These services are designed to ensure families receive the right support at the right time from the right professionals.
