Create a Cairn.

Explore outside and make a cairn. Cairns are man-made towers of natural stones. Use a range of flat rocks and pebbles in different sizes.



Stack them in order, with the largest at the bottom and the smallest at the top. Leave the stones where you found them so that other people can enjoy them too.



Explore nature and go on a colour walk.

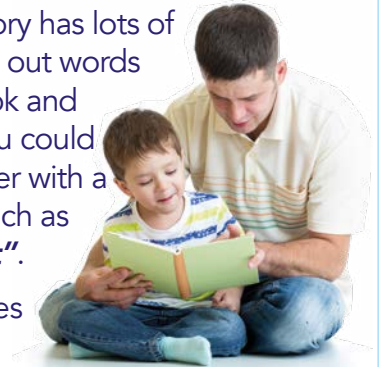


Ask your child to find and point out objects that are different colours. Can they find an object for every colour of the rainbow? Talk about how the objects look, smell and feel.

Help your child learn how to rhyme.

The Wild Wild Wood story has lots of rhyming words in it. Pick out words that rhyme from the book and play rhyming games. You could build a sentence together with a set of rhyming words, such as **"the cat sat on the mat"**.
